President's November Message

Four or five years ago, Lloyd Lee and Al Merritt were discussing how to go about getting a stretch of I-94 renamed to honor Washtenaw County Vietnam Veterans. They asked Ypsilanti Township Supervisor Brenda

Stumbo for guidance, and she put them in touch with our State House Representative Jimmy Wilson. Mr. Wilson got the ball rolling, and the bill passed in both the House and Senate and was awaiting the governor's signature.



On October 19th, Al Merritt, Eric Downie, Jon Luker, Wendy Hibbits, and I traveled to Lansing to witness Governor Gretchen Whitmer's signing of the bill that renamed I-94 between US 23 and Rawsonville Road. The new name

is **Washtenaw County Vietnam Veterans Memorial Highway**. I presented the Governor with two Chapter Challenge Coins, one for her and the other for Lt. Governor Garlin Gilchrist II. She seemed to know the meaning of challenge coins and stated that, seeing how she didn't have one with her, she owed us a beer. Fredo suggested it would probably cost her more than one. What I find sad is the time it took for this to move through the legislative process because Lloyd missed seeing it come to fruition.

On October 20th, we were finally able to present Stan Harrison's President's Appreciation Certificate to Steve Larkins. Steve was the Store Manager at the Ann Arbor Home Depot and arranged to have many Home Depot employees at our annual Spring Cleanup at the Memorial. They removed the old shed and assembled the new one, planted annuals and perennials, trimmed the bushes, spread the bark ground cover, and left us with several yard tools. The Ann Arbor Home Depot has been a continued supporter of our Memorial projects over the years, and we are forever grateful!

We had two new members at our October meeting: Dr. Bernhard Muller of Milan and William (Bill) Coleman

of Dexter. Welcome Home Bernhard and Bill. Both are Army veterans. With these two new members, our head count is now 216.

President's Report:

Treasurer's Report:

Reports were emailed to the Board and to members who wanted one. Let Bourne know

your email address if you desire these reports. The significant nonrestricted revenues came from the Clinton Fall Festival and the Pig Roast. The largest unrestricted expense was the cost of goods sold at the festival.

We did not have revenue for restricted funds but sent \$840 to the VA to upgrade dinner to a steak dinner and paid \$328 to YUCA for water used at the Memorial. See note for Memorial Maintenance.

AVVA Report: Driscoll. Please see the report in the Dispatch. AVVA no longer meets at the VFW.

Committee Reports:

Merchandise: The Pig Roast and The Clinton Fall Festival produced great results due to the support of the volunteers we had from the Chapter. Next Tuesday, we are doing limited sales at the VA. We could use 3 or 4 volunteers. We are also planning to buy a new 10 by 20 popup canopy tent that will save us a lot of work and setup time. We are working on a plan to sell our two older 10 by 20 canopies to Camp Liberty.

Washtenaw County Council of Veterans: No report.

Michigan State Council: State Council President John Riling is planning on attending our November meeting. There was discussion about the future of local Chapters and the State Council. The only thing known for certain is that any Chapter that is registered in Michigan as a perpetual, nonprofit entity will be allowed to continue indefinitely, no matter what VVA National does.

Memorial Maintenance: Cutting is winding down for the season. Water will be shut off after our fall cleanup on 21 October. Everyone is invited to help. Please bring garden tools, especially garden rakes. Lunch will be served.

We are addressing a new mole problem.

Arbor Master Tree Service gave us a free consultation to review the health of our trees and shrubs and to advise us about future development. They plan to return in the Spring as well.

As stated in the Treasurer's report, we had a surprisingly high water bill. We consulted with YUCA and the company that installed our irrigation system. We learned that our bill could be reasonably expected given how we programmed the irrigation system during the hot, dry weather we experienced during the 50-day billing period. We will check

again for leaks when the irrigation system is blown out. We do not expect bills that high in the future, except when we encounter long, hot, dry spells.

Website: We have had 386,436 visits since the current version of the website came on line a few years ago.

Membership: Including the two members who joined us tonight, we are now at 216 members.

Newsletter: No report.

Health Care: The VA now has the updated Senior Flu vaccine, the RSV vaccine and a new annual Covid vaccine you are encouraged to get. Due to a change in the VA's policy, any person born of a veteran (any gender, any time frame) who was born with a birth defect may now file a claim for compensation. David Saims, Director of the Washtenaw County Department of Veterans Affairs, has agreed to help get those claims filed. You are encouraged to call ahead for an appointment at 734-973-4540.

Any person who has a child born with a birth defect is encouraged to register with <https://birthdefects.org/>. Your registration will help VA understand the need to offer compensation as well as to help researchers learn more about how birth defects happen and how to help those impacted by toxic exposures.

After we visit all the patients we can, we plan to go to the Sidetrack Bar and Grill. We will soon schedule our annual embroidered shirt Christmas giveaway.

Merritt: Breakfast on Friday 13 October 2023 will be at 0900 at Holiday's Restaurant, 2080 W Stadium Blvd, Ann Arbor, MI 48103, (734) 668-1292.

Driscoll: According to NPR, Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin announced that a small cell of special operations forces is now assisting Israel with intelligence and planning. The Pentagon also redirected the Gerald R. Ford carrier strike group to sail toward Israel. On Friday, the USS Dwight D.

Eisenhower carrier strike group will leave its home port of Norfolk, Virginia, and sail for the Mediterranean.

Draper: The American Legion has three events planned for Veterans Day: A flag raising ceremony at 0720 at Veterans Park; a ruck March from Veterans Park to the VFW; and breakfast at the VFW from 0800 to 1100. VVA 310 loaned the Legion our large grill for that purpose. All are welcome to the breakfast.

Merritt: Four years ago, Lloyd Lee and I came up with an idea to rename part of I-94 (between US 23 and the Belleville Road exit) as The Washtenaw County Vietnam Veterans Memorial Highway. With help from State Representative Jimmie Wilson, the bill was finally approved by the State Legislature and will be signed by the Governor on the 19th. A few of us have been invited to the bill signing ceremony. We were shocked to learn that each sign will cost \$4,700. We are honored that Ypsilanti Township Supervisor Brenda Stumbo told us that we won't have to worry about that because the Township will pay for the signs.

Perrault: Most of the flags we retire at the Watch Fire Ceremony come from the Saline American Legion, who collects them all year. We are collecting more flags each year. So far this year, we have collected over 35 egg cartons full. That is far more than VVA can handle. One of our members has a connection to a crematory. A respectful flag retirement occurred there that reduced the collection by 25 cartons.

Long: I received a call from Pete Hegseth Fox News in New York about another doctor. I was able to ask the reporter if they will report on the recent news that M-16s were put in to service in Vietnam despite the manufacturer and the DoD being aware that they had a malfunction that would cause them to jam. The reporter was interested. We'll see what happens.

Kinzinger: We are having our Christmas Packing Party on Sunday, 5 November. As usual, we start packing at 1500 and are done by 1530. If you want to help pack, be here by 1445. If you have things you want to donate to the boxes, be here by 1430. Each time we do this we spend over \$1,500 on postage, so if you want to contribute to shipping costs, that would be appreciated as well. This year, the packages will go to West Point grad-

uates who are presently deployed outside CONUS.

Throneberry:

- I spoke with Kate Melcher today. She said they broke ground on the Detroit Fisher House today.
- I want to thank you for your support of Veterans Radio. Thank you for your contributions to our annual fundraiser. Contributions made by you and others at our recent fundraising event at Dr. Fretz's house met our fundraising goal – enough to cover all our operating expenses for one more year.
- It is time to find and train my replacement. If you know somebody that would like to learn the radio business and be the on-air person for Veterans Radio, please ask them to contact me.

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HONORING NOVEMBER ANNIVERSARIES ON THE WALL

Private First Class Daniel John Illi was born on December 6, 1945, to Mr. and Mrs. Erwin G. Illi at St. Joseph’s hospital in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Daniel graduated from Ann Arbor High School in 1964, where he played football and was a member of the Troubleshooting Mechanics Team. Before entering the Army on November 3, 1965, Daniel was a rental manager for Liberty Land Company affiliated with Butcher and Willits Building Company of Ann Arbor. He married on February 5, 1966.



Daniel Illi completed his basic training at Fort Carson, Colorado, and was stationed there until transferred to Vietnam on August 2, 1966. Daniel served with B Company, 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division operating out of An Khe, Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam. Daniel was killed by small arms fire on November 1, 1966.

Daniel John Illi is survived by his high school sweetheart and wife Shirley (Smith), parents, two brothers, and a sister. He lived 20 years, 10 months, and 25 days. Daniel is resting in Bethlehem Cemetery in Ann Arbor, Michigan. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. He is also listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, on Panel 12E Line 002.

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Private First-Class Robert Allen Albertson was born on January 1, 1947 in Ypsilanti, Michigan, to Mr. and Mrs. Vern Albertson. Robert graduated from Ypsilanti

High School in 1966. He worked at the Ypsilanti Plant of the Ford Motor Company prior to entering service in the Army on May 3, 1966.

Private First-Class Robert Allen Albertson started his tour of duty in South Vietnam on October 11, 1967, serving as an infantryman with A Company, First Battalion, 8th Cavalry, First Cavalry Division. Robert died as a result of small arms fire on November 4, 1967, after being In-Country for only 23 days.



Robert Albertson is survived by his wife, parents, and two brothers. Robert lived 20 years, 10 months, and 3 days. He is resting in Highland Cemetery in Ypsilanti, Michigan. His name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial located in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. Robert's

name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC on Panel 29E Line 018.

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Private First-Class Donald Barrett Roddy was born on March 7, 1943, to Mr. William Roddy of Gloversville, New York, and Mrs. Mary B. Woolfenden of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Donald is a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High School after attending Shaker High School in Latham, New York, for his freshman and sophomore years. He also attended Northern Michigan University in Marquette, Michigan, where he was a member of the Chi Sigma Nu social fraternity. Donald entered the Army on January 13, 1965.



Private First Class Roddy began his tour of duty in South Vietnam on August 18, 1965, serving as an infantryman with B Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. Donald was killed on November 15, 1965, because of enemy small arms fire during the Battle for the Ia Drang Valley. According to an Ann Arbor

Newspaper article written by Gary Lillie, "Taking part in the first battle of LZ X-Ray was Pfc. Donald B. Roddy, a 1962 graduate of Ann Arbor High School. As a member of the 'Lost Patrol' of Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry, he lost his life along with the rest of his machine gun crew as they fought to cover the withdrawal of their fellow troopers to safer ground. The account can be found on Page 87" ([We Were Soldiers Once... and Young](#), by Joseph L. Galloway and Lt. Gen. Harold G. Moore). Donald was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star Medal.

Donald Barrett Roddy is survived by his parents, his stepfather, and a brother. He lived 22 years, 8 months, and 8 days. Donald's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ann Arbor. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, on Panel 03E Line 061.

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Private First-Class Robert Clarence Skinner was born on June 21, 1951. Private First-Class Skinner began his tour of duty in Quang Nam Province, South Vietnam, on September 27, 1969 serving as a Motor Vehicle Operator with Headquarters and Service Company, 1st Shore Party Battalion, 1st Marine Division, III Marine Amphibious Forces. Robert was killed on November 16, 1969.



According to a posting left by Sergeant Eddie G. Hammonds, Jr., "I served with PFC Skinner in Vietnam. He was killed on his first night patrol. I will never forget the night or his courageous valor. You will not be forgotten, because I remember."

Robert Clarence Skinner lived 18 years, 4 months, and 25 days. He is resting in the Platte Township Cemetery, Benzie County, Michigan. Robert's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Ypsilanti. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, on Panel 16W Line 086.

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Engineman Third Class Robert Edward Kushmaul, Jr., was born on August 9, 1948, in Adrian, Michigan, to Mr. Robert E. and Mrs. Maxine De Verna Kushmaul. Robert is a 1966 graduate of Chelsea High School, where he was the president of his class, a charter member of the Key Club, a member of the Student Council, and President of FFA.



Engineman Third Class Kushmaul entered the Navy on February 2, 1967. He began his tour of duty in Kien Giang Province, South Vietnam, on February 15, 1969, serving with Patrol Boat River 8131, Task Force 116, United States Naval Forces, Vietnam. He was killed while on a river boat patrolling on the Song Hkau Giang River south of Saigon on November 16, 1969, from a

rocket explosion.

Robert Edward Kushmaul, Jr., is survived by his parents, a brother, and a sister. He lived 21 years, 3 months, and 7 days. He is resting in Oak Grove Cemetery in Chelsea, Michigan. Robert's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Chelsea. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, on Panel 16W, Line 084.

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Sergeant Rickie D. Sparks was born on July 26, 1947, in Beecher City, Illinois to Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sparks from Manchester, Michigan. Rickie is a 1965 graduate of Clinton High School in Clinton, Michigan, where he played varsity basketball and football. He entered the Army on September 1, 1965, and completed his Basic Training at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. He com-



pleted his advanced training at Fort Polk, Louisiana. Sergeant Sparks began his tour of duty in Binh Duong Province, South Vietnam on February 20, 1967, serving as an Armor Reconnaissance Specialist with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 16th Infantry, 1st Infantry Division. Rickie was killed on November 18, 1967, as a result of multiple fragmentation wounds.

Rickie D. Sparks is survived by his parents, a wife, and three brothers. He is resting in the Riverside Cemetery in Clinton, Michigan. Rickie's name is listed on the Vietnam Memorial in Ypsilanti Township under Manchester. His name also appears on the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, DC, on Panel 30E, Line 019.

Nov 22-25, 1963

I always reflect back this time of the year—especially this year, as it marks the 60th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's death in Dallas, Texas, on Nov 22nd, 1963. As a career Navy man just coming off five years of sea duty, I was sent to Naval Station at

Anacostia, Washington, D.C., for a tour of shore duty. That turned out to be the most memorable tour of my naval career, a tour that was to last three years: April 63-66.



I had been working at a desk job in the

logistics field. As we all know, we get assigned duties above and beyond our specialties. The United States Navy ceremonial guard is permanently stationed at Anacostia as well. The guard puts on Navy funerals at Arlington National Cemetery, greets heads of state at the White House, and performs other duties as called upon.

From historical narratives, we know that President Herbert Hoover and General Douglas MacArthur were both ill at that time, and the ceremonial guard just might have been called to do two state funerals in addition to their regular duties. That would have required all hands on deck, and they needed to be prepared.

From my department, two names were submitted to supplement the guard, just in case. (As it turned out, the two dignitaries passed away in 1964.)

Treating it as a memo that was added to my regular duties about noon on that fateful Friday, November 22, 1963, my wife called and said that President Kennedy had been shot. Lois was at that time six months pregnant with our first child. The next time she saw me was on TV at President Kennedy's funeral. The press knocked on my parents' door back in Hazel Park, Michigan, and asked, "Did you know your son was on TV?" I recall a one-star general coming around the old Senate chamber asking our names and where we were from.

Remember, no cell phones back in those days. I think just the old dial ones (LOL). Can't recall if it was the base police or the shore patrol that came and whisked me off to the Ceremonial Barracks, which, by the way, was just a block away from where I worked. There we were told some of the gruesome details and why we were assembled. Not having ever faced something like that, we assembled and practiced a little, using a trash can (standing as a casket) and brooms and mops (standing as rifles) for what was to come. I will be brief for the rest of that weekend. A few of us were taken to Crawlers Funeral Home on Wisconsin Avenue, just a bit down from Bethesda Naval Hospital, where Kennedy's body was. I remember peeking out the funeral home window and seeing all kinds of lights from the press outside. It was getting dark about that time.

Then we were off to the White House, escorted through the basement with lots of folding racks, trophies, and other things. I came to find out the White House police used them, and I suppose they were a shelter of sorts in the Cold War days. Not the entire Ceremonial Guard, as they consisted of dozens of sailors, a few of whom were sent to the White House theater at that time. I recall sitting on JFK's twin size plywood bed (I think), as he had a WWII related bad back. I even thought of "borrowing" a throw blanket with his initials on it but changed my mind.

At 4:30 am on the 23rd, President Kennedy's remains were brought to the White House grounds. I happened to be the 3rd one in line as he arrived. I glanced down at Jackie's now famous pink suit skirt and saw

the deceased president's blood stains.

We were then taken back to the theater to await further duties. Lying in state in the East Room, there were former presidents and other dignitaries for viewing on that damp, drizzling day.

Then we were off to the Rotunda. As fate would have it, I stood the very first watch, having Mrs. Kennedy and daughter Caroline kneeling at the casket and President Lyndon Johnson laying a wreath. Surrounding the entire Rotunda was the press and just about everybody of our government and foreign heads of states. Watch duties were approximately 1/2 hour on and about 3 hours off just in daytime, although viewing was 24/7.

I will never forget the silence and reverence of the people as they passed by that area. Public viewing was to be limited. I'm told the line was some 22 blocks long; so, additional viewing was allowed throughout the night. A few of us were housed in the old Senate chambers off from the Rotunda, and at night, in Ft. Myers, in DC.

To make my dress uniform trousers look like a stove pipe, a rubber grommet was worn at the bottom. For sailors who can remember, the trousers had the infamous 13 buttons on the front to you-know-what. To relax the tension on the trousers, when one sat down, a few of the buttons were released and covered up by the jumper of the uniform.

Mrs. Ethel Kennedy (Bobby Kennedy's wife) came in looking for a phone, and a few of the sailors, soldiers, and marines knew who she was and stood up as a courtesy. I couldn't, as my "undies" would have shown.

Back home, I arrived just in time to watch President Kennedy's burial in Arlington. To this day, I can't remember how I got back to our apartment.

I have collected quite a bit of memorabilia on his funeral and sealed it up for my granddaughter to open and share with her children when she is 60, which will



be the 100th anniversary of his death. On the 50th anniversary, 2013, my 16-year old granddaughter convinced herself and me to go to Dallas, and it was very special. One may google

George Perrault Michigan today for some of those details. I still get very emotional, as I get older, to talk

about such things. They just don't happen every day, you know.
